I think the bigger issue is that Tump isn't the problem. Society is. Both sides today think there is one truth and one set of correct values or views of reality. We convince ourselves that our view is the right one because to admit most of what's going on in the world is a big fat unknown is too frightening. We can't know for sure what is really happening on the other side of town let alone around the other side of the world. How can we know what the truth is? Twitter accentuates every minor ripple into major news. Technology has given us a false sense of our own power over the void. The truth is really, really hard to know. Factchecking is a prime example of people trying to create new ways to know the truth because our old ways are discredited. We want the truth, but we can't handle the fact that truth is elusive. Life is about ambiguity and uncertainty. And that's not easy for people to cope with.

We have gotten to this weird place where everyone has chosen a side, including the people who were supposed to be the arbiters of truth, and people can't accept there is more than one way to be. Trump is just the grifter who took advantage of this. We think people who we disagree with are morons and deplorables. We have lost the ability to just disagree and accept that we don't know it all. That's why we have politics. Politics is how we come together to create a reality we can live in together. We don't have to agree on everything, but we can at least agree on some things. Now, without trust and acceptance of difference, even that reality is under threat.

With respect to the pollsters and how they did this election cycle: the day of reckoning for the industry has been coming for a while.
